On behalf of the board and staff of Siloam Health, we want to extend our warmest gratitude. Throughout the many challenges of the 2020-21 fiscal year, your unwavering prayers, support, and generosity enabled Siloam to show up for our new neighbors from all nations in amazing ways.

COVID-19 has affected us all in profound ways, but none quite like the uninsured, underserved, and culturally marginalized who seek care at Siloam. As the saying goes, "we may all be in the same storm, but we're not all in the same boat."

We began the fiscal year by welcoming new patients to Siloam's first satellite clinic in Antioch, then the epicenter of Nashville's COVID-19 pandemic. Thanks to generous supporters like you, this expansion not only

increased Siloam's overall capacity to more than 5,000 individual patients, but Siloam Antioch also served as a base for our invaluable COVID response efforts. These included unprecedented low-cost, walk-in care for COVID-suspect patients, innovative community health outreaches designed to foster safety, education, and vaccine readiness in particularly vulnerable immigrant communities, and direct vaccination clinics in the early months of the rollout for those who felt uncomfortable going anywhere else for their shots. In just a few month's time we administered nearly 2,000 vaccines!

As you read through this annual report, we hope you recognize how vital your support has been to over 5,000 fellow Nashvillians who previously had nowhere else to go. Your support is both encouraging and empowering to us as we seek to live out our mission of sharing the love of Christ by serving those in need through health care.

Siloam Health passes milestone of over 500 COVID-19 vaccines administered

For 17 years, Medical Assistant Emad Khalil has been an inspiration inside Siloam Health's walls and to the community-at-large as a respected and sought-after voice in medicine - especially in Nashville's Coptic Egyptian community.

"Even people who don't know I work for Siloam ask me about medications or where to seek help if they don't have health insurance," he said smiling.

When the COVID-19 vaccine rollout began, those inquiries significantly increased as many of his community friends expressed doubt about the vaccine's safety.

"Many of us in the immigrant community are dealing with twice the sickness and death due to COVID-19: our loved ones here in America and those in our home countries," he reflected. "We've been praying for a vaccine, but some are afraid to take it because they have so many unanswered questions."

From rumors about side effects to worry about its efficacy, Emad believes most of the questions he's received about vaccination fall under one category: misinformation. "Anything can look scary when you don't have enough information," he said. "Our role at Siloam isn't just to administer vaccines, but also to answer questions and ease people's minds."

For Emad, the time Siloam took to provide that additional vaccine education went a long way. "I was confident about taking the vaccine because Siloam's doctors and nurses prepared me with details about its effectiveness," he said. "After taking it, I felt proud knowing I'd done my part to help protect myself, my family, and my community."

That pride also comes from being an important part of Siloam's efforts to ensure immigrant communities are not excluded from pivotal conversations about the vaccine due to language barriers or other obstacles.

"The first step to reducing vaccination hesitancy is erasing fear," he said. "Siloam's work with immigrant communities using materials in their languages proves it's willing to confront those fears directly."

Emad says efforts like these are the crucial bridge between underserved communities and the health care they need.

ABDUAL'S STORY





Abdual Sattar Alsabeh's friends told him about Siloam Health after he lost everything and moved his family from Iraq to Nashville. As a new-american without access to health insurance getting what he needed to stay healthy and manage his diabetes became almost impossible. He needed to find a new primary care doctor, but soon found out he couldn't afford to do so or even fill his diabetic medication prescriptions. After his first visit to Siloam, he was surprised by the level of care he received from each member of the staff.

"This is not real; it feels like we are not in a medical center but that we are just family," he said. "This is the best medical care I've ever had."

A native Arabic speaker, Abdual shared not even a language barrier interfered with the genuine attention Dr. Kristin Martel provided as she took the time to be friendly and fully understand his needs during his last check-up.

"I know Dr. Martel cares about my physical health, but she cares about more than that," he relayed. "It's not about just the medical things; she also called cares about the spiritual and emotional side of me, which helps put me at ease."

For Abdual, receiving whole-person care started as simply trying to manage his diabetes but quickly moved beyond that to address all the facets of his well-being. Dr. Martel helped him connect with fellow Arabic speakers from Iraq to address his feelings of isolation in America, which also relieved some anxiety and stress. Siloam Health's Patient Relations staff helped educate him on COVID-19 and even scheduled his vaccination so that he could safely connect with his community again. Together, Siloam's team made a positive difference in his health and happiness - a difference Abdual isn't shy about sharing with others. "I take every opportunity to tell my friends to go to Siloam to find the friendliest medical care," he said with a smile. "They care about every part of you."



BERENICE'S STORY



When Metro Public Health Department (MPHD) Community Health Worker Berenice Oliva first called Lidia, she wasn't sure where to start. She knew Lidia's husband was in the hospital fighting COVID-19 and that Lidia was now quarantining with her two children, unable to work and without support. And from her own experience as an immigrant, Berenice knew that Lidia might be hesitant to talk to a stranger.

"I decided to begin by sharing my own story," Berenice says.
"I told her I understood what she was going through because my family has a similar background. Once she saw that I understood her experience, there was a new level of trust built with me."

When COVID cases first began to rise in Nashville, MPHD called on Siloam Health's already-established and proven community health worker program to help care for immigrants and refugees during the pandemic.

"The COVID-19 pandemic disproportionately impacted our minority and immigrant neighbors in Nashville," says Dr. Alex Jahangir, Chair of the Metro Board of Health. "As the city developed and implemented plans to ensure that these residents received the care, services, and information needed to successfully address this crisis, the partnership with and leadership of Siloam Health proved invaluable."

Berenice was one of the community health workers (CHWs) hired through our partnership with MPHD to serve those who speak Spanish, Arabic, and other languages spoken by immigrant community members.

"CHWs help immigrants impacted by COVID-19 navigate the social, economic, and health challenges they're experiencing," says Amy Richardson, Chief Community Health Officer at Siloam Health. "Because these CHWs are already trusted members of their communities, they can more effectively bridge the gap between the resources that are available and the people who need them."

Community health workers work with COVID-positive clients by helping their households quarantine safely, connect with health resources, and combat financial strain. CHWs know what their clients are going through because they have walked through many of the same challenges themselves.

"This is a program we see having ripple effects as trust is built between immigrant communities and the public health systems that exist to care for them," says Amy.

If you've visited Siloam Health any time over the past decade, there's a good chance you've met Dennis Caffrey. A volunteer Spanish interpreter since 2011, in October 2020 he hit a milestone no other Siloam volunteer has ever achieved: contributing 5,000 hours of individual volunteer service to Siloam Health!

Three times a week, Dennis drives from his Murfreesboro home to serve at Siloam, where he interprets for patient visits, trains new volunteer interpreters, and regales staff members with stories from his time in the United States Air Force. In fact, he says there's an adage from the military that speaks directly to Siloam's dedication to "making a way" for those we serve.


"If you find something blocked, make a way. Create an opening," he shared.

It's a sentiment Dennis carried over to his service at Siloam. Every day, he makes a way for patients, not just so they can communicate with their doctors, but so they can be truly seen, heard, and understood.

"Interpreting is much more than just being able to hear something in one language and then render the equivalent in another," Dennis says. "You have to have empathy for patients; you have to understand the cultural context on both sides. It's like a when you were a kid, and you created a telephone out of tin cans and string — interpreters are the string between the two cans."


As he bridges language and cultural gaps, patients more fully benefit from the "noticeably different degree of care" he says Siloam provides.

"There's a personal connection made at Siloam, a level of attention that isn't the case in many other medical settings. There's a big belief that no matter what a patient's situation is, we can always make a way."








